October is Learning Disabilities Month events took place across the province including Sudbury and its satellite offices in North Bay, Sault Ste. Marie and Timmins. The Presidents from Cambrian College (Bill Best), Canadore College (George Burton), Sault College (Dr. Ron Common) and Northern College (Fred Gibbons) all graciously agreed to be Honourary Chairs. And during media events, the Mayor of each city proclaimed October as Learning Disabilities Month and helped raise our flag at their respective City Halls. Signing the Proclamation in Timmins was overseen by Jim Chalmers (CAC Timmins) and Lynne Berthiaume (Northern College)

To help create awareness, a total of 5,890 small blue flags were planted in North Bay. Sault Ste. Marie, Sudbury and Timmins. These flags represented students who have been identified with a learning disability in each community. The first city to plant their flags was North Bay where volunteers helped plant 2,200 awareness flags at One Kids Place. Next stop was Sault Ste. Marie where Grade two and Grade six students from St.

Paul's Elementary School helped plant 1,100 awareness flags on the lawns of Sault College. Staff and volunteers planted 1,700 awareness flags along Paris Street in Sudbury; and the Mayor of Timmins, Steve Black, helped students plant 890 awareness flags in the gardens at City Hall in Timmins.

PARENTS AND CHILDREN

Seven Essential Life Skills Every Child Needs

Focus and Self Control involves many executive functions of the brain, such as paying attention, remembering the rules, and delaying gratification.

Perspective Taking calls on many of the executive functions of the brain. It requires inhibitory control, or inhibiting our own thoughts and feeling to consider the feelings of others; cognitive flexibility to see a situation in different ways; and reflection or the ability to consider someone else's thinking alongside our own.

Communicating effectively is important to positive development young minds. It involves not only the act of speaking non-verbally and verbally, but also actively listening to the other party/parties involved. This promotes development of perception checking, critical thinking, and impulse control.

Making Connections begins with sorting and categorizing. The next step is understanding that certain things can represent another, like the difference between a fork and a spoon; both are used for eating but have different purposes. This involves multiple executive functions of the brain like your working memory.

Critical Thinking at its core is the ongoing search for valid and reliable knowledge to guide our beliefs, decisions, and actions.

Taking on Challenges helps develop coping skills and stress management tactics. Both positive experiences and negative experiences can be stressful and by encouraging kids to challenge themselves we can build on skills such as critical thinking, reasoning, and problem solving.

Self Directed, Engaged Learning is an important skill to teach kids. It helps them to work from a strength based perspective, discover their motivators and interests, and build on learning strategies that work to their advantage.

NORTHERN CREDIT UNION SUPPORTS STUDENTS WITH LEARNING DISABILITIES ACROSS THE NORTH

The Northern Ontario Centre for Learning Differences (NOCLD) is growing across the North. The NOCLD is tasked with the goal of increasing the reach of existing programs and services currently provided by the Learning Disabilities Association of Sudbury to the communities of North Bay, Sault Ste. Marie and Timmins.

In support of NOCLD, the Northern Credit Union has launched a True North Strong Communities campaign. The NOCLD campaign is called **We Are Not Alone** and will support parents and families of children and youth with learning disabilities.
