Over the past three years, NOCLD has helped support over 1,300 parents in navigating the educational system and over 1,800 children and youth with support in understanding their particular learning disability. The NOCLD was established in January 2016 when the Learning Disabilities Association of Sudbury (LDAS) received a three-year, \$600,000 Grow grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation to extend the reach of their existing programs and services to

other communities across the north. Provincial grant funding is set to come to an end on March 31, 2019, however the organization is committed to securing sustainable funding so that families in North Bay, Sault Ste. Marie and Timmins will continue to be supported.

“We are proud to welcome Fred Slade as Honorary Chair, and look forward to continued discussions with our political leaders and community stakeholders across Northeastern Ontario, as we promote and seek investments to sustain the valuable programs and services currently being offered in North Bay, Sault Ste. Marie and Timmins,” said Mary-Liz Warwick, NOCLD Executive Director.

The NOCLD team of Resource Facilitators support and advocate for parents of students with learning differences, and help to facilitate positive working relationships between home and school.
